

An Olive Tree to Talk About the Journey

To conclude the year of celebration of the 185th Anniversary of the life of the Adorers in the world, an olive tree was planted in the garden of the Casa Madre in Acuto on February 10. The Adorers from different parts of the world who were in Rome to celebrate the 2020 Extended General Council, took part in the event. In Acuto, from the Church of the Casa Madre, in front of the altar of S. Maria De Mattias, the participants moved in procession. Each sister carried a jar containing the soil of her place of origin, while the Superior General, Sr Nadia Coppa, carried the olive tree. It was a rainy and foggy day that discouraged going outside. However, singing and praising the Blood of Jesus, the procession reached the flowerbed prepared to plant the tree. At the prayer of gratitude and blessing pronounced Sister by Nadia, each superior or representative of her own reality poured the soil on the roots of the young tree. In the

wonder of observing the variety of colors and substances that the soil presented, we wondered if the tree would take root.

A week later we were notified by the gardener that the olive tree is in excellent health. The strength shown by the

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small plant in standing and growing makes us understand how much courage is needed to take risks. In the act of being transplanted into new soil, the olive tree risked not taking root, of not blooming any more. On the contrary, it has shown us that "getting back into the game" gives us the real possibility of being born again and again.

It has also shown us that this rebirth can occur from the nourishment of different soil, of different colors. Colors that enclose the whole world and

that make the olive tree an allegory of a new journey, the same that the Adorers, after 185 years of history, want to express.

Albania Special

A Mission Signed by the Cross

The History of the Congregation, written by Sr. Antonietta Maraone, gave this title to the paragraph on the Adorers in Albania. Following is a brief summary of their history.



The Adorers arrived in Albania in September 1939. They had been invited by the conventual Fathers in Lishnia, a town between Durazzo and Valona, where they would have a great apostolic field. The first four Adorers were: Sr. Palmina Canalicchio, Sr. Pia Garelli, Sr. Elena Boco and Sr, Giuditta Curati, sent by Mother Agnese Maroncelli of the then province of Cagli. In spite of the difficulties of the language and material poverty, the cause of hardships and great sacrifices, they tried to respond to the many material and spiritual needs of the people. In 1941, they had already opened a pre-school and laboratory in the town and took care of the sick. It was the time of communism and so the families were not allowed to send their girls to school, the sick could not make use of the clinic, under threat. The persecution of the Church and of religious by the communists became more and more intense until the Sisters, together with other missionaries, were driven out and forced to repatriate. On March 12, 1946, 86 of these missionaries arrived in Brindisi, Italy.

We have to wait for the 90s and the fall of the Berlin Wall before the Adorers are presented the possibility of returning to Albania. It was Caritas of Apulia with its director, Sr. Maria Bambina Centra, an Adorer of the Blood of Christ, to give the Province of Bari the opportunity to return to take care of a people destroyed in its dignity and values due to the fifty years of communist dictatorship. The community of Durazzo and Mamurras, established shortly afterwards, thanks to the testimony of the Italian Adorers who followed and those still working there, but especially thanks to the life witness and apostolic zeal of Sr. Agnese Bianchi, vocational fruits resulted. Today, four ASCs of Albania serve the Albanian Church, bowing over the wounds of their people to give them hope again.

In this ministerial context, with the people and among the people, they suffered a violent earthquake the night of November 26, 2019. It shook this strip of land facing the Adriatic Sea, bringing suffering and death once again.

The General Superior, Sr. Nadia Coppa, called upon the Congregation to make a gesture of solidarity for the victims of this disaster. On Christmas afternoon, 2019, Sr. Nadia went to visit the Sisters just a few days after having returned from Tanzania. She shared the winter cold and hardships as well as the joys of the Sisters and the people because of her presence.

The Sisters, Suela Pepa and Anna De Robertis in Durazzo, and Sisters Natlina Pepa with Anna Carcagnì in Mamurras, were involved in the work of helping the families who lost their homes. The money collected due to the generosity of the entire Congregation, is giving them the opportunity to buy prefabricated house where the homeless families can stay and have privacy. The Sisters are continuing the work of accompanying them and giving spiritual and material support to those who still need it.

Sr. Suela Pepa, animator of the Durazzo-Mamurras constellation, wrote us this letter: My dear ASC Sisters,

As you know, Albania was struck by a strong earthquake on November 26, 2019 which took many lives and loved ones, but also homes and certainties for the future

More than a month and a half have passed and for the city of Durazzo, Tirana, Lac and the outskirts, still nothing has been decided whether the homes of many people have to be razed or rebuilt. In Thumana there is great desolation. There is a lot of construction work to be done there but no one knows how, where and who will do it. Thanks be to God, the continuing aftershocks are rarer and much lighter and, little by little, they are imperceptible, but the damage they have left continue to be present, even though the government immediately removed the rubble of the collapsed buildings. In some areas, like that where our community in Durazzo is located, where there is not much apparent external damage, the insides of the homes are have serious cracks and life seems to have stopped. The silence of the day and the dark of night give witness to it.

The people housed in hotels are being told they need to leave because they can no longer stay there. Tourist season is approaching and the hotels need to get ready. Many people spend their nights in the homes of relatives, sleeping on mattresses on the ground because of limited space, while others spend their nights in the courtyards of their own homes in summer tents or in make-do plastic tents.

As you can well understand and imagine, in these cold days of ice and strong winds that have at times torn down the tents, the condition of these people is truly sad. It is a difficult situation for the adults and we can only imagine for the children who try to huddle under blankets under the sky.

Like a true family, united not by human blood, but by that of Christ, you let us feel your love and nearness through phone calls, mail, prayer and not just that. We want to thank each of you as individuals and as community who with great generosity and commitment have gathered $\leq 10,000$ for our mission, brought to us by Sr. Nadia Coppa, General Superior. She came to be with us and touch our reality with her own hands during these days. We are very grateful to you because you did not leave us feeling alone.

We used your contributions to acquire inhabitable modules for the families in the village of Thumana. The people cried when they saw that they had a "house in which to dwell during these sad days for them and especially for the children. They didn't know how to give thanks, offering as gift what little they had, a handful of nuts, a bottle of brandy, a pair of wool socks. And they kept thanking us. The families are offering prayers and blessing for each ASC. The greatest joy for us ASCs who work here is seeing smiles on the faces of the children and the adults again.

Certainly, the needs are many, but we are trying to respond to the c<mark>ry</mark> of the desperate and those without hope, and we are doing what we can together with those who are supporting us.

In the name of the ASC community in Albania and of all the people who were helped, we want to thank you for your generosity and ask the Lord to make us more and more hospitable women who know how to open our hearts to the cry of the poor, the least and those forgotten by everyone else.

Change and Transformation

The 2017 General Assembly Direction Statement calls us to embrace the process of transformation. Since we received this call, I've been listening to podcasts, doing some reading and reflecting on this topic. This led to a renewed interest in the Enneagram, the personality typing assessment that I first encountered about 40 years ago. I was surprised to discover that it has made a resurgence among younger generations today. One of the things I appreciate about the Enneagram is that it is an invitation to explore who you are, based on the motivations for your thoughts and actions. It has evolved over the years to include tools for growing in health and wholeness. The goal is to become the person God created you to be. That's what I call the process of transformation.

Suzanne Stabile, in her podcast, "The Enneagram Journey," makes this distinction between "change" and "transformation."

"Change happens when you take on something new and transformation occurs when something old falls away, usually something that seems beyond your control."

She goes on to say, "Our way of knowing ourselves is so comfortable that it has to fall away for us to see ourselves any differently. When we "change," we just add things on top of an already too big a personality. We have to observe ourselves nonjudgmentally and let what doesn't serve us or and in 2016, Pope Francis formally recognized him as a martyr for the faith. He was beatified in 2017.


others well, fall away."

While there is certainly frustration around this reality, I also noted a growing acceptance and appreciation of who they are at this moment in time. I heard sisters talk about letting go of the need to be busy. I saw a paring down of the things that surround them. They shared about the simplicity of their prayer, the appreciation for community, and their desire and ability to let go of past hurts. I believe that the wholeness and the peace I witnessed in these sisters is that shift toward transformation. Being in the presence of people who know their truest selves, because they took on the great work of embracing the process of transformation, gave me hope and gives me the encouragement to stay on this path of transformation.

May the gift of this anniversary of 150 years of ASC presence in the United States, be the resurgence of our commitment to individual and collective transformation. May we continue to become who God is calling us to be.

Region of Sagreb Mission of Australia



These days we thank God for the rain he poured on our dry and burning continent. Although we were not in direct danger of fire, we could feel the smog burning in our eyes and throats. Sometimes the smog was similar to fog what made our surroundings invisible. The sun and the sky changed the color signalling an imminent danger.

Ten sisters in Australia live in two communities: Adelaide and Sydney. Most of them are retired, but they still do their best by working in many missions. We visit the elderly, the infirm and the lonely. We communicate with the people who ask for spiritual help and counsel. We prepare adults for the sacraments, teach the Croatian language at the Croatian School, and we care socially and spiritually for Croats in the desert parts of Australia.

From the very beginning, we have been present in the spiritual animation and guidance of the people in the "Cardinal Stepinac" Nursing Home. The home is very nice and of very good quality. The elderly and infirm Croats there, together with God's love and reconciliation through God's word and sacramental life, receive health care.

A large number of Croats living in Sydney, have built in the St. Johns Park and Blacktown the "Cardinal Stepinac" Home, two churches and gathering centers. Love for their country of origin they transmitted to the younger generations. Young people sometimes work two jobs in order to earn sufficient money to spend the summer in Croatia. Living in Australia is different from living in Europe. People in Australia spend all day on their working places. The working places are very distant from their homes, but everything is well organized. Because of that, it is very difficult to bring the people together for singing or for other free time activities and events at the Center. The young people, in addition, have a language problem. Because their Croatian language knowledge is very poor, in order to understand a priest's sermon, most of them, together with their families, go to the English speaking Australian parishes.

Sydney has a population of almost 5 million made up of 150 nationalities. The degree of their mutual acceptance is extremely high. Churches of various Christian communities as well as Hindus and Buddhist temples are visible. It can be said that Australia is representing a small world.

Everybody needs the power of Christ's Blood. All of these people have suffered huge difficulties. Like every Croat, they could write a book of their suffering and problems they had to face and solve.

Today, some other people are refugees, to whom Australia opens its doors and helps them adapt as soon as possible to the new environment, as it once did to the Croatian people.

We have to pray for the Australian country and people, soak everybody in the blood of Christ and serve God in every human being.

Prayer against trafficking

On Saturday, February 8, the memorial of St. Josephine Bakhita, the protectress of slaves, the celebration of the Sixth World Day of Prayer and Reflection Against Human Traficking was organized by the Union of Major Superiors of Italy. A vigil of prayer and music, testimonies and liturgical readings was held in Rome in the Basilica of St. Anthony of Padua. The international formation community of the Sisters Adorers of the Blood of Christ in Rome with the novices participated in the organized program.

Cardinal Michael Czerny, undersecretary of the migrant and refugee section of the Dicastery for Service of Holistic Human Development presided at the prayer service.

Many Sisters belonging to various orders working daily in the struggles against slavery were present at the prayer vigil.

"Human trafficking," Cardinal Czerny explained, "is manifest in many aspects. Probably the best known is the sexual trafficking, but numerically, exploitation in work is perhaps more important. There is also the cruel and horrible organ trafficking as well."

There were five candles on the altar, each wrapped in scarves symbolizing the 5 continents. There were three empty chairs in front of the altar to represent exploited women. There were also some boxes of fruit as a symbol of the exploited workers on the farms of many countries coming from Asia and Africa, as well as other symbols: an African cloth, chains, a world map and a picture of St. Bakhita, who was a victim of slavery.

The vigil ended with the faithful tying together many colored threads, uniting theirs with that of the person next to them in the pew. The celebrations continued the following day with a march to St. Peter's Square, to attend the Angelus with Pope Francis.

In speaking through the Roman Observatory, Cardinal Michael Czerny said, "The most consistent response of the Church against trafficking in the first world has always been that of the Sisters. They are the first to approach the victims and offer liberation, if possible, and then rehabilitation and

finally their integration or re-integration into society."

The march from Castle St. Angelo to St. Peter's Square for the Angelus was held on Sunday, February 9. During his discourse, Pope Francis recalled St. Josephine Bakhita and spoke about trafficking, encouraging "everyone's commitment, that of institutions, associations and educational agencies" to heal this "wound that exploits the weakest."
