new evangelization, through a journey of mercy.



THE ECONOMY AT THE SERVICE OF THE CHARISM AND THE MISSION

Presentation of trends about the economy for consecrated life


On Tuesday, March 6, 2018, Sr. Manuela Nocco, general treasurer, attended the meeting organized by the Congregation for Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life (CICLSAL) to present the latest document, "The Economy at the Service of the Charism and the Mission."

In these difficult times it seems ever more necessary to talk about the economy. Through this document, consecrated people are urged to deal with this topic by keeping two important criteria in mind: professionalism and evangelical values.

Competent people need to be prepared to steward the economy of an Institute in a correct way and it is good to make use of outside lay consultants who know the world of consecrated people and can accompany the economic management according to gospel values. Economic matters cannot be delegated exclusively to the general or regional treasurer or to a small group. It must be the responsibility of everyone to assure transparency and sustainability. For this, it is necessary that this aspect of daily life re-enters also into the formation process that congregations have to carry out for the holistic formation of candidates.

The document offers some operative leads and meaningful sharing that can help in dealing with the difficulty in the management of goods and to open some reflections and discern a more evangelical use of resources.

It is confirmed in the document that institutes are not enterprises; therefore, financial management has to know how to create situations of ju-



stice and solidarity. Criteria for management of goods are recalled, among which is faithfulness to God and humanity and especially faithfulness to one's charism. The economy at the service of humanity in its wholeness.

Money needs to serve and not govern. The economy needs to be at the service of the charism and the mission, and not the contrary.

WORD OF GOD AND ONGOING FORMATION

The Word of God is the reference point for the formation of any believer, but especially for us, Adorers of the Blood of Christ, who some months ago during the General Assembly decided that "at the Word of Jesus we embrace the process of transformation, giving priority to the daily listening of the Word." (cfr. 2017 GA Acts) The

Word of God and ongoing formation was the topic for reflection for the Lenten prayer day of the international community at the generalate on March 3. With the help of Sr. Wiesława, ASC, the sisters had the opportunity to reflect and pray on the value of the Word of God in ongoing formation.


Sister Wiesława indicated that the Word of God is the most important place of our formation process. In fact, the Lord accompanies us each day and forms us through His Word. The concept of ongoing formation is this: God deeply desires that the same sentiments that were His Son's also be in us," (cfr. Phil. 2:2) and form us through every Word that come from His mouth and through his intervention with concrete actions. God's Word is that expression of the plan of God the Father and Teacher in us and thus what we call ongoing formation is nothing other than divine action in our lives.

Formation is ongoing if it is daily and not just entrusted to extraordinary courses, prayer days or annual retreats. Ongoing formation happens through an ordinary process, daily events and unexpected situations. Furthermore, it happens in community, with our sisters and with those with whom we live that become the mediation of

the Father's formative action. The Word of the day is the privileged way of our formation

Each of us receives from God the gift of the Word in the daily liturgy, where God is revealed and offers us what we need that day. In fact, we are incapable of accepting God's revelation in its totality, thus, day by day God the Father in his

pedagogical wisdom suggests something new to us about his reality. The Word of God of the day is the food the Father prepares for us. The Hebrews in the desert were nourished daily by God's providence with a mysterious food. We, in the Word of each day, find the food we need and what God is asking



of us that day.

Through the Word of the day God reveals something about Himself (theophany), but He also reveals something new regarding ourselves, our vocation, what we are called to be (anthropophany.) Attraverso la Parola del giorno Dio rivela qualcosa di se (teofania), ma Egli ci rivela anche qualcosa di nuovo riguardo a noi stessi, alla nostra vocazione, a quello che siamo chiamate ad essere (antropofania).

Each day we are called to read it with faith and certainty so that this is assumed as a lifestyle.

The 2017 GA Acts want to lead us back to the beauty of this relationship. We hope that the relationship with the Word of the day in the life of each Adorers is not just a pious act, but I desire that it flows freely from the heart, without which we cannot live.

February 22-25

For several day we were preparing to welcome the General Superior and Council who will spend this time in our Community to work as a team. We are truly happy for their choice. Especially Sr. Palmina Totaro was carpenter, electrician, plumber, porter, furniture mover, etc. etc., to set up the rooms and all the environs in order to eliminate discomforts which unfortunately the house presents because that part of the house had not been used for a long time. BLOOD FROM A DIFFERENT VEIN CAME ALONG TOGETHER...

Barangay Muzon is the largest Barangay in the City of San Jose Del Monte Bulacan, which the Philippine government decided to put as a relocation site for every informal settler, whose habitation had been demolished in various areas in Metro Manila.

The relocation site has been called San Jose Del Monte Heights which become a new com-

munity made up of almost 5000 families coming from different places and having different beliefs. It is not easy for the relocatees to cope with the new environment to which they need to adapt. They'd been

searching for any organizations, institutions and people who will help them build a better com-

munity. They need a better water supply, electricity, a school for the education of their children and a clinic that will provide their needs on health issues. Some of the relocatees are regular patients of St. Maria De Mattias Mission Clinic

in Tandang Sora, and those patient keep coming back to Tandang Sora to have their regular check ups, because there is a lack of medical services in San Jose del Monte Heights. That scenario served as an eye opener to the Adorers of the Blood of Christ to conduct a monthly medical checkup in the community which they believed that health

issues should be prioritized.

As part of the mission, the Adorers find volunteer women that will be their collaborators in the area; they provide a proper seminar and training to educate these women not only on the needs of the community and health education but also give a commitment to the mission through the help of the spirituality of St. Maria De Mattias.

The Mission started in 2015 and continues today. It has almost 500 regular pa-

tients of all ages.
This mission also gives importance to those who had pulmonary disorders, teaches them and guides them on the proper process of medication, encourages them to undergo the process

and motivates them to finish the treatment they need.

Just like other goals and dreams, this mission experiences different difficulties just to be successful every month, but through the help of the people who openly offer their hearts, lend their time and effort just to help, nothing is impossible.

This mission has a huge effect on the improvement of the medical services in the place; this mission calls attention to the local government to improve the medical facilities of the area. It

gives an opportunity to those who cannot afford to visit any hospital, due to financial matters and distance from the medical facilities.

This mission is a real blessing to the residents of the community and for me as the youngest collaborator of the Adorers. It taught me more about life, to give importance to every person you encounter and treat them as a blessing from above.

Don't hesitate to help even in small things, value everything you have, and if everything seems negative find a positive part about it and learn from it, believe that everything happens for a reason, don't be selfish in sharing your smile. Aside from the medicine prescribed by a physician it can really ease the paine felt by someone.

It is really nice that this mission gave us an opportunity to have another family, with which you can share the feelings you have, the thoughts rambling in your mind and share the things you're concerned about the society.

The time we shared is a priceless moment that we will never forget.

The "thank you's" we've heard from every patient, in addition to the faith planted within us that is continuously growing, it serves as fuel to continue this wonderful mission from above, through the guidance of St. Maria De Mattias.

TRANSPORTATION CHALLENGES IN BOLIVIA

On Jan. 2, I began my travel to the Assembly of the ASC Bolivian Foundation in Santa Cruz. It turned out to be a 25-hour bus ride because the road had two unmarked gigantic holes which provoked the bus ahead of us to collide with a truck full of chickens. Six people died in the accident and many more were injured. Chickens dead and alive were all over the place.

That night, we began our assembly in the new house in El Quior. Present were seven of us ASC professed, a temporary professed, a postulant, Dani Bought and Maria Hughes. The assembly went well and we reflected on the implications of what it meant for us as a Foundation "to throw out the net at His Word."

Late on Jan. 8, in the afternoon Gaby, our postulant, and Zonia, temporary professed, and I traveled all night to Cochabamba, a city of a million people located in the center of the country. At about 7 a.m., we arrived on the outskirts only to find out there was the first of many road blocks. We gathered our backpacks and suitcases

and headed downtown on foot. After walking an hour and a half, I realized I was near the house of my friends, the Sinsinawa Dominicans. Rather than continue on another 7.5 miles to our ASC house in Quillacolla, I decided to ask for lodging with them, since



it would facilitate my participation for the next three days in the Assembly of the Bolivian Conference of Religious (CBR).

Gathering with several hundred religious from all over the country, we pondered what it meant to be missioned, and in particular, to be missioned in this time of crisis in Bolivia. Our meeting took place with the background sounds of pelting rain, explosions of dynamite, sirens and crowds of people outside shouting protests. President Evo Morales has been in office for the past 12 years, and is determined to continue for at least another term, even though the Constitution does not permit him to do this. He had hoped to get around this with a referendum several months

ago, but the people rejected his proposal.

Tension is building. The doctors in Bolivia have been on strike for weeks. Public transportation workers, coca growers, educators and other groups have also been protesting.

We of the CBR decided last night to join the people downtown in silent protest.

As we are now finishing the assembly, I will try to buy a bus ticket to return to La Paz. The roads are supposedly open, but because the government is assuming more control over social media, it is hard to know what to believe. According to Evo, everything has been and continues to be "normal."

I ask myself if this is the new normal. The upshot of these travel adventures is my decision to buy a cell phone to expedite my pilgrimage through life, and especially these transportation challenges in Bolivia.



SPECIAL HONOR TO ST. MARIA DE MATTIAS ON 4TH FEBRUAR

The 4th of February, 2018 is the birthday of our Foundress of our Organization St. Maria De Mattias. In our Region every community celebrated this day in a special way starting with the Holy Mass and recreation with other people after the Mass. On that day we were very happy because our foundress St. Maria De Mattias gained a great and special honor. It was the day when the church with her name was officially opened.

Thus, this feast was also celebrated in a special way in the

church of Saint Maria De Mattias parish - Mivumoni, Dar es Salaam. On that day the church of St. Maria De Mattias was officially inaugurated by the Cardinal Polycarp Pengo. The Holy Mass started at eleven o'clock in the morning with a procession then followed by the blessing of the church and dedication of altar. A relic of St. Maria De Mattias given by the General Administra-



tion is located in this church. The ASC Sisters of the communities of Dar es Salaam and Vikawe participated in the Holy Mass.

In the homily, Cardinal Polycarp Pengo said he was very grateful for the generosity of the parish Christians and their self-sacrificing hearts because they never asked him for help in building this church. They struggled with all their strength and their hearst to make sure that this church's building would be completed.

The history of the parish of St. Maria De Mattias began when the-

re was a need and importance of Christian education for children and other religious teachings. In January 2009, the believers decided to build a little building which would be used to teach religion to the children. However, the construction was unsuccessful; instead they decided to build a church in January 2010. When the construction of the building was nearly completed, the church





received a status of sub-parish and was inaugurated by Fr. Felix Mushobozi, the General Secretary of the CPPS Congregation. This sub-parish was under the direction of the Parish of Precious Blood, Tegeta, in Dar es Saam, and the parish priest was Fr. Richard Tiganya CPPS, and later on was Fr. Josephat Msuya, CPPS.

Previously this sub-parish was under the custody of St. Monica. Later the custodian was changed because the name of St. Monika was used by some parishes and sub-parishes of the

diocese. According to the instructions of Cardinal Polycarp Pengo, Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Dar es Salaam, on 28 August 2013 this Sub-parish was officially placed under St. Maria De Mattias as a custodian until now. The church received the status of a parish on July 7, 2014 and was handed over to the minister of the archdiocese of Dar es Salaam and its first parish priest is Fr. Edwin Epimack Kigombo.

According to the testimony provided by Parish Priest Fr. Edwin and some parish Christians



is that, in their efforts to build their church, they succeeded without restrictions and always prayed to Saint Maria De Mattias to ask her help and they believe that through the intercession of this woman all the work was successful and finally they could complete the church's building. They said that they were always encouraging each other to provide construction contributions using this statement, "Let us continue the spirit of St. Maria De Mattias" and give generously. They believe that St. Maria De Mattias really was a great help to them because everything went well until the end.

In this preparation of the inauguration of the Parish, the sisters of our community of Vikawe, Sr. Euphrasia Julias and Alphonsina Alexander, were invited to give a seminar about St. Maria De Mattias. The purpose was to help the believers of this parish to know more about St. Maria De

Mattias, the patron of their church. Many of the parishioners participated in that seminar because they were eager to get to know more about St. Maria De Mattias. The sisters talked about the history of St. Maria De Mattias, her mission, charism, and her relationship with St. Gaspar. The believers were very happy.

We thank God for the gift of our mother, St. Maria De Mattias. We thank her, too, because she was ready to fulfill God's will and striving to make her presence to be a prophetic and reconciling presence. We congratulated Fr. Edwin and the believers of the parish of St. Maria De Mattias for their efforts to build their church. FOUNDATION DAY CELEBRATED IN LIBERIA

A Sunday and a great day to celebrate the congregation's birthday but no sleeping in for us. We leave the SMA Center at 6:30 for 8:00 Mass at the military base chapel. On the way S. Zita and I pray morning prayer in honor of St. Maria in the car. Music is lively and traditional Liberian at

the Post.

We immediately go to another substation, St. Mukassa. The choir director and animator is a Liberian woman who has lived in Minnesota for years. She has prepared a hymnal for this

"parish" and taught them the songs (over 200). We begin Mass with "Let All Who Thirst" sung well. The readings were those for the rite of initiation - 'twas nice to have the Gospel of the woman at the well on our feast. Songs were appropriately chosen for the readings. It was a delight

to participate in this Mass that Father Firmin was offering for our congregation.

At both sites we were asked to introduce ourselves and say something about the Adorers. And, as has been happening, S. Zita again met some people she





knew from former Grand Cess days.

Father Daniel at St. Mulumba had invited us for dinner to celebrate our feast (hint: no cooking on Sunday). We arrive at 11:50 and the 9:00 Mass is still incomplete - they had four different special groups honored during Mass. At 12:15 people began to leave and two amazing and very generous choir members arrived to begin the cooking. Parishioners are in and out, some grabbing a bite of rice, others a soft drink. At 2:00 we are offered some rice and a chicken leg to tide us over until the meal - fried goat, fish (delicious), rice, fried plantain and a cake for dessert - is ready. The wait until 4:00 was long but the wine we brought, along with the conversation and people (about a dozen), made for a pleasant afternoon.

Of course, there was a major football (soccer) game on TV and we couldn't leave before it was completed. While some watched, S. Zita and I le-

arned more about how people think about Liberia from two Ivory Coast business men who now live in Monrovia and three women from the parish. The current and new President George Weah is well liked but inexperienced in government.

They believe much will depend on his cabinet ministers and if he can persuade Congress to make some Constitutional changes. Education, health care, reduction of corruption are major challenges.

The infrastructure here is also lacking in business practices, resulting in great inefficiency and making it difficult to attract businesses. We certainly have experienced this in the process of buying the automobile and getting proper documentation. By the time we are ready to leave we will know half the people in the chancery by first name!


