

Exultate) Pope Francis indicates to us through the Beatitudes the effective options of holiness that pass through the preferential option for the poor for the purpose of overcoming every form of isolation, individualism and indifference.

The blessed of our globalized society of indifference are called to take sides against those who exploit the weak.

They are challenged to look at reality by trying to save the people dying of hunger and thirst, to not forget the homeless and those deprived of instruction and give them their dignity again and work, making the most of what we have that is not being used, because holiness is not virtual; it is real.

The blest do not pay for their choices with money, but with bills of gratuity, throwing their hearts open toward everyone and not wasting time in everyday futility in order to embody the Gospel of joy, undermining the conformist's rationalism which often ends up influencing proposals that are aborted before they are even generated.

Maria De Mattias is a saint because she made the beatitudes her field of action. Hers were a taking of sides, since she offered room for the growth and holistic development of the person, going against the culture and customs of the

times and siding with the exploited women of late nineteenth-century society.

Who knows what she would say today or where she would want her Sisters to be present. Who knows what projects she would carry out in dealing with the killing of girls and women, the perpetuation of the scourge of abortions or the lack of educating toward gospel values.

Certainly, she would say to put on the clothes of the revolutionary women of the Gospel like Mary of Nazareth, or Mary Magdalene the convert or the Samaritan woman who went from being a woman with many husbands to a missionary.

It is also up to us, as the Church of the third millennium, as consecrated women of the "old world" to rejuvenate it with prophetic choices and merciful ones.

We are called to reinvest in our structures, to design faith journeys for our communities, to renew our works and above all to begin to connect the words of holiness with complete openness to the newness of God.

A GOOD EXPERIENCE WITH COUPLES

The association of "Couples for Christ" (ECC) is a movement of the Catholic Church for the evangelization of families and the building up of the Reign of God, present in Brazil and in other countries, which promotes ecclesial encounters on a parish level.

In Brazil, the 'ECC began in 1970 in San Paolo with the priest Alfonso Pastore, in Our Lady of the Rosary parish. It offers spirituality processes for couples centered on poverty, simplicity, joy and prayer.

Its objective is the evangelization of the family- the domestic church – and aims to broaden the horizon of the families from a parish vision to a more global one.

On April 28, the young Zaira Magalhães, a psychologist of Our Lady of Guadalupe Hospital in Belem, and I, as an Adorer of the Blood of Christ, were invited by some of the couples of the ECC to coordinate one of their meetings in the Parish of St. George, located in the Marambaia quarter in the outskirts of Belém.

The topic was "stress" as a factor of the family break up. Thirty-two couples attended and beginning with the slide presentation offered their reflections and were involved in group dynamics.

The salient points of the topic presented were: the concept of stress, physical and emotional attitudes, causes, symptoms and personal and family consequences - pathology.

MY LAST VISIT TO THE PHILIPPINES

Six months after my departure from Quezon City, a painful but necessary departure in order to respond to the call to the new ministry entrusted to me, last March 26 I had the opportunity to return to that place so dear to me. The Rome-Manila trip seemed brief to me, in spite of its being a 14-hour flight, and the Sisters were there to welcome me with joy. My stay in the Philippines lasted for three weeks. I knew that time would fly by and that each moment would be a gift to be lived with joy and openness. In fact, I was aware that my task, my involvement and my belonging to the Foundation terminated with this visit. When I got there, all the Sisters present in the Philippines were gathered in the central house to celebrate Holy Week and to make their annual retreat in preparation for the Foundation Assembly. Sr. Mary Kevin Rooney, who had arrived from the United States a few days before, was also with the group. She will be staying until December. Sister Mary Kevin, together with Sr. Manjusha Joseph from India and the two young ASCs from Vietnam and two young Indian ASCs, will form the community of the Asian continental area juniorate.

During the days of my stay as a guest, I once again joyfully experienced how the Foundation is a small but vital reality. The sharings of the Sisters in the Assembly, the choices made during recent years, the decision to extend the ASC presence from the North to the Center of the Philippines, involvement in a new ministry for young people and in service to the local Church all reconfirmed it in me.

Vitality is also expressed through openness to this intercultural and international experience of the continental area juniorate which accepts the diversity of the ASCs from Asia and the United States for a time of formation.



The Sisters of the Foundation show it, not the least, with their daily choices alongside the “little ones,” supporting and serving the girls in difficulty with their social-educational center and their health services for the poor and excluded. In this commitment is their style of involving and sensiti-

zing the people of the more affluent classes so that they might share their goods with the poor in solidarity and responsibility.

Returning there made me think about the journey made during these years that challenged me to grow in acceptance of diversity, an experience that was not always easy. The certainty that new life can be born, only from seeds sown in a land that accepts to die, always accompanied me in moments of resistance, insecurity and risk.

I am deeply grateful to each Adorer of the Foundation for having given me the opportunity to journey together, sharing the joy in successes, enthusiasm in dreaming and encouragement to hope in difficult times.

I am grateful to all my friends, especially to the Franco family, for always having made me feel at home, with affection, support, trust and appreciation.

Sincere thanks goes to the collaborators of the “St. Maria De Mattias” Mission Center, who trustingly journeyed in the faith in Jesus Christ and, believing in the value of life, were open to freely serving the neediest. They helped the patients who, trustingly, gave us the opportunity to serve them with our gifts and limitations, in our attempt to witness that the love of Jesus heals, the power of His Blood saves, and life is a precious gift to be protected, defended and loved because it is always a gift of God.

THE FEAST OF THE PEOPLE

In an epoch characterized by the encounter of different and often distant cultures, we feel the desire, as an international community, to dedicate a day to the celebration of interculturality. Last April 21, the generalate house gave space and time to the "Feast of the People." Some of the Rosminian seminarians and Sisters from the San Giovanni regional house also participated in the celebration. Each culture chose a dish to represent its country. At the generalate, 8 different countries are represented (Benin, Brazil, Croatia, India, Italy, Korea, Poland and the United States.) On the day of the celebration Kenya and Tanzania were also added. For two days our kitchen was a theater of wonderful and succulent culinary creations ranging from the caipirinha drink of Brazil to the hors d'oeuvres and appetizers from the United States. There was white polenta with fish sauce and bean fritters from Benin and Croatian cevap and pita sa sirom. Other dishes ranged from palappam from India to Italian rustic dishes and grilled meat, from Korean rice balls to delicious Polish apple cake.



The Rosminian seminarians from Tanzania brought a typical Tanzanian banana and beef dish usually prepared for marriage celebrations, while their Indians brought lemon rice.

Our dining room was decorated with flags and colored drapes and the decorated tables were a real celebration for the eyes and for the "tummies."

Besides the taste of delicious food, what made us the happiest was being together and sharing a part of our cultural richness. Each country presented songs or dances and our lay workers also offered us a typical Roman song.

As always, sitting around the table fostered a building of relationships, an exchange of ideas, sharing of insights.... Jesus knew this well and, in fact, sat at table to celebrate Easter, the new and eternal covenant which he then sealed with his Blood.

By our small celebration we wanted to give a sign of openness and mutual acceptance and the desire to grow more and more as an intercultural and international community.

ASC DAY IN THE ZAGREB REGION

The practice of celebrating an ASC Day in the Zagreb Region has by now become a tradition of regular gathering not only among the Adorers, but also of our collaborators, associates, former-ASCs, sympathizers, pastors with whom the ASCs work, and all those who follow the Spirituality of the Blood of Christ in some way. Thus, this year we made a pilgrimage on April 14 to Karlovac, to the shrine of St. Joseph, the patron of the Zagreb Region, and to Krasic, following the path of Blessed Alojzije Stepinac.

A thousand pilgrims from Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Austria and Switzerland along with 70 ASCs participated. Msgr. Antun Sente welcomed us and blessed us at the entrance from the Holy Door of the shrine and Father Ilija Grgic, CPPS, presided at the Eucharistic celebration together with eight priests on the pilgrimage who work with the ASCs. The liturgy was animated by the choir of Sr. Anna of Bjelovar, directed by Sr. Virginia Kolic with the accompaniment of Sr. Domagoja Ljubic.

Their songs filled our hearts and souls with

peace.

A historic connection exists between the ASCs and the pilgrimage destinations of Karlovac and Krasic. Karlovac is the city that has welcomed ASCs for 90 years.

The community in Karlovac was opened on January 13, 1928 and, until 1945, the main apostolate of the Sisters was a soup kitchen and pre-school. In 1960 following the donation of a house, the Sisters opened a handcraft workshop and sales shop. Since 1999, the Sisters have been living in a new house. Today they work in two parishes, teach catechism in schools and animate the liturgical celebrations in the parish. They work together with the associates in the hospital.

Krasic and its surrounding villages have given the Congregation about 20 Adorers. Blessed Alojzije Stepinac directed various young women to the Congregation of the Adorers, including some of his relatives: Sr. Emanela Jagunic and Sr. Alojzija Zupanac, his niece.

YESTERDAY, TODAY, TOMORROW

While thinking about “yesterday,” and everything that we, the staff of the “Leptirići” (Butterflies) kindergarten in Glamoč went through and thinking about the article I have been asked to write to describe the current situation, I think that I could probably write an entire book and that is why in this article, I do not intend to reflect on the past. That is a bygone in any case. It has passed. I cannot influence what we have already lived through and that is why I will lock the past away in the drawer of the past...What I can't put away in that drawer is the “consequences of the past,” because they are still here today... Today, Now.

A day from God granted to me to live, in His glory and for the well-being of the dear people I will encounter today. Today, I have the opportunity to thank many good people whom God has put on my path in life so that they can help me at least a little, while carrying my cross.

Today I want say a great thank you to Fr. Andrej and the entire Vivat organisation, for accepting to be our Simon of Cyrene and for telling our story and spreading it even to the United Nations to point out all the injustice that we, as a staff have been experiencing for years.

Unfortunately, today the situation is not much better than yesterday because we are living in a state that creates its own laws that makes it possible for those who are working in it, not to be paid decently for their work. According to the Law on enforcement procedure before the Court of BH, in this country (Bosnia and Herzegovina), an individual who has not been paid by the state and even when they manage to prove to the court that they have been wronged, they cannot receive that payment because the Law says that the amount a founder of an institution (in our case, the Municipality) has to provisionally allocate from its budget for possible court judgements, is 0.3% of the planned Budget. Imagine 0.3%!!!

If we take that into consideration in our context, the Glamoč Municipality currently owes our staff 240,000 KM (convertible marks). According to the Law, 0.3% of the 2017 Budget amounts to 7,300 KM. If I/we are to be paid our back pay

owed to us, based on the court ruling according to the incumbent Law, (in my case that is 55 unpaid wages, for the other staff, it is 32 wages), we will be paid those wages owed to us as ruled by the court for the next 30 years. Naturally, if the Law remains in force as it is today. Our future appears to be pretty glorious...

However, I don't wish to think or write about our future as something dark because I know that there is Someone, who will have the final word. He knows why I, why we, why now and how long this situation will continue.

Seeing that in the meantime, in October 2017, the man who was the source of all our suffering passed away, who personally acted in a discriminatory manner toward me with his policies and actions ...we are facing new elections.

The central electoral commission has determined the date of the snap election in Glamoč to be held on 17.12.2017. Party slates have been submitted. Should the candidate from the SNSD party currently in authority in Glamoč be elected, I believe that the situation may improve as his child attends our kindergarten and he is aware of the problems faced by the kindergarten.

One would expect that he should appreciate this situation and that this problem is important for him too, as his child spends 8 hours a day in our kindergarten. As far as I am aware, he is not someone who is radically minded however, politics are an odd game. And that is why nothing is absolutely certain and I can't help but have a little fear that politics may spoil him.

And while waiting for what awaits us tomorrow ... we have no alternative but to place everything in God's hands and live today as it is. However, we don't want to just passively stand by and wait and today we accept and love Jesus in these little children who are currently in my/our care.

Finally, when I meet the Lord of my life, the Lord of history, He will ask me how and to what extent, did I recognise Him today in those whom He has put on my path in life and He will “judge” me.
