

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A New Life

On April 25, 2021 I had the most difficult, overwhelming and joyful experience of my life ... I became a mother for the first time. Camilla was born at 11:49 p.m. ... but a new mother and new father were also born.

The first days after delivery upon leaving the hospital were really complicated for me. I was very tired from so many hours of labor and pain. People often speak about the famous "postpartum depression", but you never think it can happen to you. And instead finding myself with the most precious gift that life could give me, I was crying over the most insignificant things, I couldn't enjoy my baby, though I loved her with all my being. And I didn't know why.



And it was in that moment that I experienced the tenderness of God who was in the gestures of all the people close to me. It was in my mother's love who took care of my needs and taught me the most beautiful art, that of being a mother. It was in the apprehension of my husband who took

care of everything I needed. It was in the closeness of my father and brother who with small gestures accompanied my days. And it was in the continuing support my cousins and aunts and uncles gave me; whether near or far. They let me know of their closeness and love.

In thinking about my experience, I find myself in many of Pope Francis' words, when proclaiming the Year of the Family Amoris Laetitia, he dwelt on the "educational value" of the nuclear family:

"Sincere communion can be experienced in family when it is a house of prayer, when affections are serious, deep and pure, when forgiveness prevails over discord, when the daily harshness of living is softened by mutual tenderness and by serene adherence to God's will. In this way, the family is open to the joy God gives to all who know how to give with joy."

And now that I am a mother, it is precisely these values that I would like to pass on to my daughter so that she may grow in prayer, love, respect of herself and others, so that she will be kind and helpful and above all that she will forgive and give love without measure.

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Seminar for Leadership Formation

At 1:00 p.m. (Rome time) on October 11, 2021, the seminar on leadership and administration formation began its first online session with 40 Adorers and 35 CPPS Missionaries in attendance.

The seminar began as an initiative of the General Administration in collaboration with the general curia of the CPPS Missionaries to respond to the 2017 GA Acts: *promote participative leadership inviting all to place their gifts at the service of the whole; we work as partners with many others in co-responsibility for mission.*

And the recommendation to *evaluate the possibility of closer collaboration with the CPPS for the programs offered by CIS.*

The Seminar's theme is *New Blood for the world: the call to become spirit-filled leaders in an emerging world.*

It's objective is precisely the Formation of leaders in light of the spirituality of the Precious Blood, in the spirit of St. Gaspar's and St. Maria De Mattias' charism. It includes our brothers and sisters from different sectors of mission and from various parts of the world, from East to West and North to South who are already or will be engaged in the service of organization and leadership.

The seminar aims to promote values such as ongoing formation, interculturality, interaction among members of the two Congregations, a complementary approach to the spirituality of the Blood of Christ, growth in spiritual identity, and an opportunity for wider formation.

The activity lasts for 12 days divided into 4 online modules of three afternoons a month through the end of January 2022.

The main themes will stem from the development of the program title "New Blood for the world":

- The call to become a leader
- Leadership
- Spirit-filled leadership
- In an emerging world,

through a participative, experiential and systematic methodology. It invites the participants to revisit how they exercise their leadership role at their ministry places and improve the quality of their leadership rather than acquire theoretic

skills. The facilitators are a team of members of the international group Faith and Praxis: Emili Turù, FMS, Frances Heery and Lissy Sebastian, RNDM. Faith and Praxis is an international organization formed by religious men and women who accompany different congregations in formation processes for leadership ministry for Mission in the Church.

A ministry as challenging as that of leadership requires that we learn more and more to respond with a heart rooted in the spirituality of the Blood of Christ. Several times in recent documents, Pope Francis has referred to the importance of ongoing formation, especially in this time defined as one of epochal change.

We wish everyone a time of grace and growth in order to respond to the signs of the times, in the newness of the Spirit, with the heart of Christ, on the path opened by our Founders.

- My God, it is impossible!
- I can't believe my eyes!

These and other similar expressions were said by those who saw the people involved in the disaster or who learned of the unusual accident that occurred in front of our Precious Blood Convent on October 15, 2021. It was the day we were celebrating the feast of Sr. Serafina, which falls on October 21. I will tell the story briefly. We have a Spin car that is very useful for many jobs. Our driver, who has been working for us for about a decade, had gone on vacation and we had a young woman fill in who had previously done this work for us.

This woman, whom I will call Catarina, helps us with various chores around the house and also helps sometimes when I have computer

problems.

One recent morning she came into my room asking me to pray for a need of hers. Catarina is a non-Catholic, but I entrusted her to our Venerable Sr. Serafina, asking her intercession for this friend.

The day afterwards was the day when this inexplicable event happened. I am telling this story so that our love and devotion to Venerable Sr. Serafina will increase among us. Catarina left with the car at 1:00 p.m. to run an errand.

After the door-man opened the car door for her to get out -no one knows how it happened - the car sped across the street, stopping with a big noise at the opposite sidewalk. The street I am talking about, Venida Constantino Nery, is a four-lane street with constant traffic, especially at that time of day.

I will describe the graces we received:

1- Seeing the stunning flight of the car, a bus filled with passengers coming from the opposite direction miraculously stopped in time without being touched by our car;

2- A lady on the sidewalk with her young daughter stopped and was not touched by the car;

3- Our car stopped without doing any damage to the large building across the street from our convent.

4- Catarina was unharmed, while the underside of the car needs to be fixed.

Due to the loud noise, people ran to help the driver who had suffered high blood pressure.

We thanked our dear Venerable Sister Serafina on the 21st. Catarina came to visit me the other day just to ask me to thank Sister Serafina for her.

An automotive expert told us it was a true miracle. The accident could have caused many deaths and we would have had to pay damages to the many people because we were clearly at fault.

Well-Being in School

A psychological-pedagogical team to support students, families and teachers was formed

This response to a concrete need of our time has been a great opportunity for our area. This is the “Well-being at School” project at the Precious Blood Institute in Bari. It is a psychological and pedagogical team made available to the scholastic community by our Institute, animated by its tireless attention to the human. It also serves the entire capital of Puglia, where the Adorers have been involved in education for almost a century.

Last October 13, during a press conference, the PBI administration in the persons of the Leadership team of the Institute, Sr. Giuseppina Fragasso, Sister Francesca Palamà and Professor Angelamaria Garofalo, introduced the project and the members of the team and listening center. The presence at the event of representatives from other Institutes in the area underscored the fruitful interweaving of the life of the Institute with the entire surrounding social fabric, as well the important contribution the community of the Adorers of the Blood of Christ represents for the human growth of the city of Bari. The Ombudsman of the rights of minors, children and adolescents of the Puglia Region, Dr. Ludovico Abbaticchio, was present, as were the Councilor for Public Instruction of the Municipality of Bari, Paola Romano, and the President of the CISM Catholic Parochial Schools of Puglia, Father Luigi Gaetani.

“Well-being at School” was created in the scholastic environment to support the educational community, the students and families in the natural path of formation and growth, which is threatened today and greatly weakened by the pandemic. Its purpose is that of responding to new family and relational challenges of the children, emphasized by the isolation imposed by the pandemic situation that recently marked the whole of society.

Psychological and pedagogical support – explained during the presentation – aims to support and re-establish that psychological wellbeing necessary for educational and didactic success of each student. There are many, too many, critical issues impacting the children and teens following the consequences of the pandemic. But not only that, restlessness being in groups, excessive use of smartphones and computers are only some of the obstacles to be overcome. The school is aware of the urgent need of expert help in order not to just navigate by sight, but to know exactly where to take the right steps and be a reference point for parents who are often disoriented and ask to be educated in parenting.

Conceived some time ago and strongly desired by the administration of our Institute in Bari, the psychological-pedagogical team is made up of high-quality local professionals: Dr. Giacomina Panzarino, pedagogue, Dr. Chiara Leuci, psychologist, Dr. Francesca Gioieni, psychotherapist, Dr. Caterina Pucci, psychomotor therapist, and Sr. Liana Campanelli, teacher of justice education and graduate in psychology.

At the end of the meeting, Sister Francesca Palamà recalled how at the heart of the commitment of the Precious Blood Institute there has been the constant overall wellbeing of the person, pursued with unceasing competence and care. This year the Precious Blood Institute chose to enrich the educational offerings for children 3 to 5 years of age with the project “Playing is a serious matter!”, a pedagogical process and attention to the growth and wellbeing of the child, which includes workshops of psychomotor activities, roller skating and learning English, and aims to foster the harmonious and complete psycho-physical development of the children.





Aware that “staying close” is a mission to be built day by day, the Precious Blood Institute of Bari has also thought of a human-spiritual training program for families in order to enter into the daily lives of the parents engaged in the

educational challenge, made even more complex by recent events and in general by a society in continuous and rapid evolution. Inspired by the Global Educational Pact promoted by Pope Francis, the first step toward a restart that is able to “guarantee access to quality education to everyone that be worthy of the dignity of every person,” is the “PBI Space.” This is the title of the program proposed by the Institute to all families who would like to take part in it. It is a response to the men and women desiring encounter, dialogue and discussion among diversities.

The Power of Listening



Last November 18 at the national headquarters of USMI (Italian Major Women Superiors Union) on Via Zanardelli in Rome, Sister Emma Zordan enriched the formation course for novices with her testimony. There were about forty present in the main hall and many others connected remotely. Sr. Emma has been volunteering for more than seven years at the Roman prison, offering creative writing workshops. She recounted the path that led her to the Rebibbia Prison. Her restlessness, courage

and strength she found after passing through the prison gates and the many other opened and closed bars before she got to the penal section where she would carry out her volunteer work.

For several years she had been living in Latina where she was in charge of the St. Gaspar community of 29 elderly sisters, but each Saturday morning at eight she was unfailingly there at Rebibbia, with packets for her detainee friends. She openly says it to the sisters who were carefully listening: “That is now my family!” And in truth she is friend, mother and sister to many inmates. Even a small gesture like bringing them some candy has great meaning for them. It is like a caress of the soul.

This was confirmed by the other protagonist at the USMI meeting: Carmine C., a prisoner on probation after 16 years in various penal institutions. She was among the first to meet the Religious volunteer at Rebibbia and to collaborate with her. It was precisely the discussion between the two, at times intense, other times playful, that allowed those present to “experience” the harshness of prison life and how important it is to have the presence of someone from “outside” who knows how to listen, and show affection, attention and hope.

The instrument of this process was S. Emma's "creative writing workshop." In her talk, she retraced the stages of this work, recalling the titles of the books that have gathered the testimonies of the inmates. She then went on to present the book "Not Everyone Knows ... the Voice of Rebibbia's Inmates" which was the other reason for the meeting.

The book offers some testimonies of the inmates on hope, gathered before and during the pandemic. Journalist Roberto Monteforte, who collaborated with Sister Emma in the realization of the book, explained the reason for this choice. "The testimonies are offered to those outside the bars, to common people who are considered "free" and yet who are too often prisoners of their own prejudices that make them incapable of accepting. On this point, lawyer Antonella Pacifico, also involved by Sr. Emma in the "prison writing workshop" project, intervenes. She does so by recalling the "fear of the aftermath" expressed by many inmates. "Worrying is the violence outside the prison, made up of prejudice and precautions. So is the punishment you never finish serving because, she underlines by quoting from one of the book's testimonies," the stigma of a prisoner is imprinted like an indelible brand on your skin." Why shouldn't the sentence ever end? Why should the innocent family of the one serving the sentence pay as well? How does one deal with the aftermath? Once out, what will be the social reintegration of the inmate? The theme is present in every part of the world and involves the novices who came to Rome from every part of the world.

The strong testimony is an appeal launched by Sister Emma. "We are too few. Come to give your faith witness in serving inmates." How many rosaries they ask me for!" she added. And I invite them to pray the Our Father." Because you can evangelize in this way as well: offering a listening ear and friendship. The testimony of Carmine was moving. She recounted her dialogue with the Crucified Lord during nights of loneliness in her cell. "I pray to him, we talk, I confide in him, we argue...."

Sister Rosanna Costantini, in charge of the formation area of USMI, had already emphasized this at the beginning of the meeting. Mission

today is offering witness in concrete life, in love for the least, as Pope Francis taught us when he celebrated his first Holy Thursday not at the Vatican but in Casal de Marmo juvenile prison, washing the feet of the young inmates. This is the outgoing Church serving the excluded. Some assured that they would ask the mother general of their own Congregation for the opportunity to follow the path indicated by Sister Emma.

That's when a testimony touches the heart! One might say that one goal has been reached. But the hardest thing remains: touching the hearts of those accustomed to pre-judging without compassion and helping them discover fraternity. This is the purpose of the book Not everyone knows ... – helping people to understand and know so that we can all be more human.

Fall Formation Meetings

The Sisters Adorers of the Blood of Christ of the Wrocław Region attended the fall formation days at the Motherhouse of Bolesławiec October 15-17 and 18-20, 2021. The meeting was led by Father Stanislaw Jarosz, Pauline priest and prior of Our Lady of Victory in Brdów. His conferences, introductions to meditations and homilies were organized on the formation theme for the 2021-2021 academic year, "Those who see us, see Christ."

Together with Father Stanislaw we rediscovered the gift of life, marveled at the gift of vocation and discovered the gift of personal holiness. On the path to holiness we have been taught to forgive ourselves and others. All this was presented in a simple, illustrative, biblical and profound way.

The content conveyed and heard was not just the erudition, reading or knowledge of the leader. We heard a priest who loves God, listens to His Word and lives it, who perceives his own sin – he said of himself: I am a sinner – and especially feels he is a son whom God always loves.

The search for holiness was presented like the image of a very stable chair with three legs: the Word of God from which faith flows: the liturgy – the action of the Holy Spirit who enables us to receive God's grace; and the religious community – which "shows" my conversion. Being converted is beginning to think differently than before.

According to Father Stanislaw, a religious community is there to unmask my sin so that the mystery of death and resurrection be accomplished in us. The religious community is the mirror of my weaknesses, defects and sins. After many years of having the vows, we again learn to live in community and for community. A religious community is a place of forgiveness and forgiveness is nothing other than taking upon

ourselves the sins of others.

Father suggested to us to again invite Mary into this reality of community, as we are now, and together with her (in renewed awareness) do our domestic chores and travel the paths of our apostolate. We also learned to look at the cross of Jesus – our Spouse. Father said, "A person without a cross cannot know Christ crucified." In our fall formation course, we also heard the truth about why we are sometimes afraid of our cross. It is the devil who is scaring us with the cross.... "You will suffer, you will be sick, look at how they use you in this community, congregation, in your workplace...."

This is the time of beautiful Polish autumn – the golden colors of the leaves, the rays of autumn sun, the gift of sisterhood, personal listening to the obvious and known truths proclaimed, the meeting with a priest who witnesses his experience of God's love, and especially the immensity of God's grace enfolding us.

FRATELLI TUTTI - Chapter 8

Religions at the Service of Fraternity in Our World

The Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns ends its Study Guide on *Fratelli Tutti* with the consideration of Pope Francis' belief that religions can benefit the cause of fraternity in both Church and society. He says, "we, the believers of the different religions, know that our witness to God benefits our societies. The effort to seek God with a sincere heart, provided it is never sullied by ideological or self-serving aims, helps us recognize one another as traveling companions, truly brothers and sisters (#274)."

The innate dignity of each human being as a child of God is something which cannot be forgotten or lessened. It is part of the "DNA" that connects us to God and to each other. Religions of the world speak to this dignity and encourage followers to live according to the "Golden Rule," according to the tradition: love God, love others as you love yourself."

Maria De Mattias knew this truth "in her bones." For her, each person was "worth the Blood of Christ." Our Constitution reminds us that "our love for one another in community is our primary apostolic witness." Article 9, Chapter 2 continues: "From our local community we reach out in love, interest and prayer to all other Adorers throughout the world, as well as to our families from whom we have been separated by the gospel call of Christ. We share joyfully with all God's people the love that bonds us together in the Lord, a love expressed in a ministry that frees them to grow in communion with others." This love begins at home and spreads to the corners of the earth, an ever-widening circle of love and communion.

Community is a call to communion, to union with, to an understanding of the one essence that unites us all and all of creation. The "red cord" that binds us together is the same that unites us to all. The question, then, for us to ponder as we seek to live into the call of *Fratelli Tutti* is

"How does my call to covenant relationship with God and others take flesh each day as I walk the way with those around me and with the earth?"

What/how might I be being called to change in my relationships that will help bring about "that beautiful order of things?"

What will I choose to do about it?"




